As a library user, you have access to online resources like Ancestry Library that can speed your search. This is identical to Ancestry.com, but it's free at the library. There are also newspaper archives and other sources to make family history research more productive.

Because they're made available by your public library, all you need is a library card to access most of these resources from home.

As an added bonus, you also can turn to a librarian for additional help.
